The global canid phylogeny continues to be improved with more comprehensive data (e.g., Bergstrom et al. 2020), supporting the phylogenetic position of the Dingo as part of an Asian lineage of domestic dogs. The IUCN Canid Specialist Group (Alvarez et al. 2019) placed the dingo under the binomial <i>Canis familiaris</i> . The Dingo is as genetically divergent from other domestic dogs as they are to each other, and mtDNA reveals shared haplotypes with domestic dogs and New Guinean singing dogs (e.g., Oskarsson et al. 2012). Although hybridisation can occur between canid species, they continue to represent distinct divergent lineages with reproductive isolation. The evidence does not suggest the Dingo is a unique divergent lineage from the New Guinea singing dog or southeast Asian dogs. The evolutionary history of the Dingo needs to reflect its position in the entire lineage of Asian and Melanesian dogs, including the lineage distribution outside Australia. Species typically need hundreds of thousands to millions of years to diverge. The recent arrival and isolation of the Dingo in Australia (probably within the last 4,000 years) has resulted in some distinct features, likely due to founder effects, selection and genetic drift. Although the Dingo appears to show some functional differences (e.g., Field et al. 2022), such differences are at a population level and do not translate to reproductive isolation. The Dingo's distinct ecological and behavioural features are not diagnostic of species status. Therefore, the weight of evidence strongly suggests that Dingoes should not be considered as a different species from domestic dogs, and thus, they are placed here under <i>Canis familiaris</i> as a distinct population of wild canid. Future research will of course continue to inform the taxonomic status of dingoes and other dogs. The Dingo has important cultural, ecological and management value. The taxonomic placement of the Dingo in no way diminishes the importance of conserving them as an ecologically important animal in Australian ecosystems.
